

PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends of St. Croix Catholic,

The gift of a Catholic education is one that can never be underestimated. As seen on the cover, our new iconic mural, *Christ in Majesty*, greets our children each day as they pass under the welcoming arms of the Lord. It is an image of mercy freely given to each child, teacher, and parent of our school. We desire each child to remember that the wounds they suffer were once suffered by the One who redeemed them, and that He walks with them in their joys and sufferings in the halls of St. Croix Catholic. We cannot be grateful enough to Mr. Nick Markell, the master iconographer of this great work and of his iconographers guild in the St. Croix Valley. It is one of the many gifts that keep on giving through the years!

On May 13, the St. Croix Catholic Iconographers Guild gifted a 12'6" x 7'1" handcrafted iconic mural entitled *Christ in Majesty* to the St. Croix Catholic School community. The work, completed in four months by a team of nine led by local Master Iconographer, Nicholas Markell, is meant to portray the strength that one gains by being a believer in Jesus Christ. Placed strategically at the top of a stairwell leading into the intermediate and middle school areas of the school, Sister Mary Juliana, the school's principal, shared at the May unveiling and blessing ceremony, "It is our hope that as our young people walk through this portal, they will be reinforced with Christ's cross. Because of our faith, we know Christ will come again. He will walk with us again. This reality should give us all a sense of hope."



"Iconography differs from art in that it is not so much an image of the natural world as a window into the spiritual world. Icons depict not so much what we see, but what we believe," explains Markell. "Iconography is a visual vocabulary. Theologians use words to communicate the faith; iconographers use images. In the case of the *Christ in Majesty* work, it communicates our belief that Christ is King, and nothing of this world will stand between us and the eternal salvation He offers."



Borne in the Early Church, this ancient Byzantine art form was de-emphasized during the centuries-long split between Eastern Orthodox and Roman Catholic (Western) practices. Pope John Paul II is credited in part for its revival, and revitalization has indeed taken hold. Less than a year old, the St. Croix Catholic Iconographers Guild has grown to 41 members. Founder Judy Symalla, herself a newcomer to this ancient art form, explains the attraction. "I love the art, but the spirituality is what has really drawn me in. This communal project – now a gift to our Catholic school – was a deeply spiritual experience for all participants. Nick does an incredible job of explaining the practical reason and theological meaning behind every intentional step of the process. For example, egg tempera and various other natural elements are applied in certain manner so as to create a sense of light coming from within, just as our own light of faith comes from within. There are so many dimensions to this faith-building experience. It's truly life-changing."

"Life changing" is exactly the result that Markell hoped for as he embarked on his iconography career some 25 years ago after contemplating how to blend his artistic talents and a spiritual calling. Markell explains, "Iconography is a process that God is using to make us anew. Our Guild's logo includes the words, 'Remember our future.' As we go through the process of creating an icon, illuminating one light after another, we remember that we, too, are called to become icons. Slowly but surely through this life, we are being reconciled to God so that we can be one Him."



Hail Mary, Full of Grace



Under the direction of St. Croix Catholic's art teacher, Mrs. Pam Fioritto, the 2015 8th grade graduating class created 59 mosaic stepping stones, representing the beads of the rosary. "Each stone is as unique as the student who created it," noted Mrs. Fioritto. "Some are defined, some abstract, some even include objects of meaning from their days here at SCCS." Principal Sister Mary Juliana adds, "It is very fitting that this is the class was chosen to help transform this rather plain area into a beautiful meditative path. Like this area, this class has undergone an amazing transformation. At the beginning of their 8th grade year, we challenged the students to look inward to learn and accept their God-given temperament, recognizing their strengths and weaknesses and those of their peers. Through the nine months of the school year, we witnessed the painfully shy stepping forward into leadership roles; the bold stepping back and letting others shine. The most wonderful formation has been that they seemed to understand that all they do, they do for the glory of God. This will be a wonderful place for these young leaders to continue to come back to and reflect on the greatness God has in store for them."

Alumni Grant Opens Doors

New for 2015-2016 school year, the SCCS Alumni Grant provides direct support to parents who are alumni of St. Croix Catholic School, thus continuing the school's rich legacy of forming generations of Confident, Compassionate, Christ-centered Leaders.

Realizing that a growing number of today's young families are facing tuition levels beyond their means, benefactors of St. Croix Catholic School collectively joined efforts in Spring 2015 to establish the **St. Croix Catholic School Alumni Grant**.


Starting with school year 2015-2016, a **\$1,000 tuition grant** for the first year a child is enrolled at St. Croix Catholic School in any grade K – 8 will be made to parents who are alumni of St. Croix Catholic School. **No application is required for the grant; only proof of parent alumni status is necessary.** A **\$500 tuition grant** will also be awarded to the family for the child's second year tuition at St. Croix Catholic School if the family is current on their tuition payments. The Alumni Grant does not extend beyond Year 2.

This grant is separate from and does not affect any other form of discount or tuition assistance. It is purely a collective gift from benefactors of St. Croix Catholic School in hopes that the school's legacy of being the "home" of multi-generational families will continue for years to come. Should an alumnus decide that he or she is not in need of this gift, it may be reserved within the Alumni Grant program for other alumni families to access.

TEACHER FEATURE

Mrs "E" '90

"In 1986, when I was sitting in Mrs. Kindseth's fourth grade class, I wanted to be a teacher. I often thought, 'Wouldn't it be funny if I taught fourth grade here, just like Mrs. Kindseth?' During my high school years, I dismissed the idea of teaching to pursue something...else. I wasn't sure what my career would look like, but I definitely was not going to be a teacher. It took me a long time to open my ears and realize what God was saying. I often think if He had just sent me a postcard, it would have been easier for both of us."

Just as God had planned, Sonia Tatroe Eberspacher, 1990 graduate of St. Croix Catholic School, is now back at her alma mater teaching fourth grade.

Affectionately known as "Mrs. E" because, as she explains to her fourth graders, "When you say 'E,' you smile, but when you try to say E-b-e-r-s-p-a-c-h-e-r, you frown," the investment Mrs. E has made in answering God's call is apparent and genuine. "I could tell from Day #1 that Mrs. E was truly invested in her students," shares Molly Krakowski, mother of Max who just completed fourth grade. "At the beginning of the year, she asked all the parents to write her a letter describing their children, asking what works best in teaching and communicating with them. She basically wanted to know what makes each kid tick. She wasn't teaching a classroom; she was teaching 19 individuals, and she was determined to see them succeed."

Krakowski marvels at how that commitment to the individual child steadfastly continued throughout the year, "Mrs. E would send home **I Saw God in You** notes each week, with special messages such as, 'You worked hard to do your best work on your story for reading. God loves it when we do our best.' Max has these notes everywhere - hidden in his bed, in his desk drawer, used as book marks. He even brought a couple up to the cabin! With those notes, he can bring Mrs. E and God with him wherever he goes!"

Mrs. E seems to have found her stride in Fourth Grade. "Fourth graders are great because their minds just seem to be ready to follow any new adventure you throw at them. They are independent, but are still happy to ask questions and accept a guiding hand. They are just beginning to see gray areas and are wanting to use their energy for good in the world. Plus they laugh at my jokes. Sometimes."

Sonia married Jeff Eberspacher in 2000 and the couple has three boys, all of whom will be students at SCCS in the fall, Kindergarten, Fourth Grade, and Sixth Grade. Motherhood, too appears to be part of God's plan. Mrs. E reflects, "I love being a mom, and it has definitely helped me to be a better teacher. When I am sitting across from parents at conferences, I know many of their fears and worries, because I share them for my own children."

A DIFFERENT APPROACH TO TECHNOLOGY

This past school year, the Richard M. Schulze Family Foundation awarded St. Croix Catholic a \$30,000 grant to implement a new virtues-based leadership program in its middle school. This leadership formation program, entitled *Created for Greatness*, is borne out of the realization that the middle school years are critical to forming life-long habits, and it is these formative years in which a young person is ripe for intentional growth of specific virtues. The overarching goal of this virtues-building program is to help students master their environment rather than allowing their environment to master them. One key area will be the students' interaction with technology. Through the funds received from the grant, the school acquired Chromebook tablets for 7th and 8th grade students for a pilot program this spring, with the intention of rolling out all middle school students (6th, 7th, and 8th) in fall. Religion instructor, Sister Grace Dominic Hargadon and history instructor, Emmi Santos, introduced the students to virtuous use of technology this spring.

Sr. Grace Dominic reflected on this year's pilot program.

What was the goal of the pilot?

The goal of the pilot was to introduce technology into the classroom in a gradual manner to ensure that the content of the lesson was still the focus, with technology engaged as an enhancement, rather than teaching a lesson strictly for the sake of using technology. Another primary goal was to ensure that technology was being used in a responsible and virtuous manner by the students, and to provide guidelines for Internet etiquette, virtuous use, and safety.

Was this spring's pilot program successful?

I believe it was very successful. One example is that the students were more engaged in lessons in which the technology was utilized and the teacher had more proof that students were on task and grappling with the content as seen through the quality of responses. Another example of success came through student surveys that polled the students on questions about engagement, misuse of technology, and further training they may need. These polls showed that no misuse was happening and that the students were really pleased with the new level of engagement and responsibility given to them.

How did the students use the Chromebooks during this pilot and how will they use them going forward?

During this pilot phase, the students used Chromebook tablets in various manners. Students used them to turn in work in a more accessible format, take advantage of the opportunity for peer reviewing and editing, and collaborate on large, multi-faceted projects. Chromebooks and the Google environment are especially useful for group assignments; a few projects required that students use Scripture to find various elements that I was looking for and to fill in a chart of information. Each group was assigned one row to fill in, and by the end of the class, all students had a completed chart to use for studying without having to copy all the information from the board. I also used Chromebooks to have the students do warm-up activities as they came into class. I would have them read a section of the YouCat (Youth Catechism) that related to the topic of class for the day and they would reflect on questions in order to be prepared for class discussion.

In building this program, St. Croix Catholic School formed a partnership with the world-renowned Harvard Virtuous Leadership Institute (www.hvli.org). HVLI offers virtuous leadership training to business executives and university students worldwide. This leadership model, *Created for Greatness*, is the first of its kind to be aimed at the middle school student. It will be tested and proven at St. Croix Catholic School, and eventually shared worldwide. **Learn more at www.stcroixcatholic.org.**


